



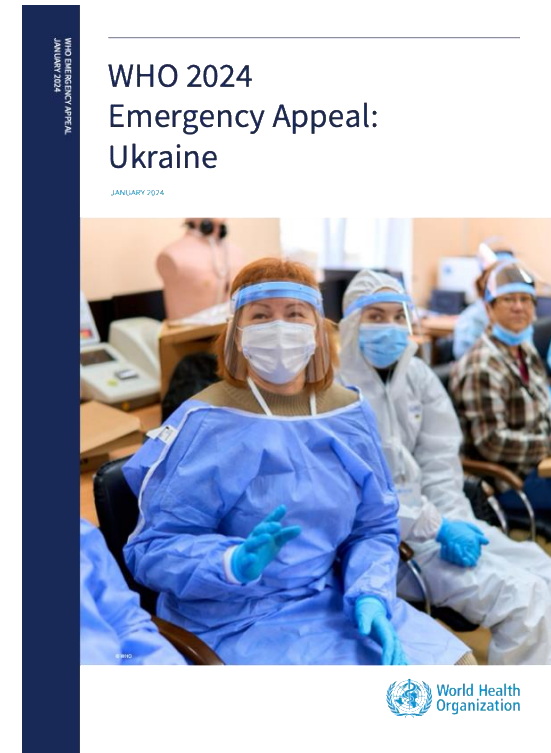
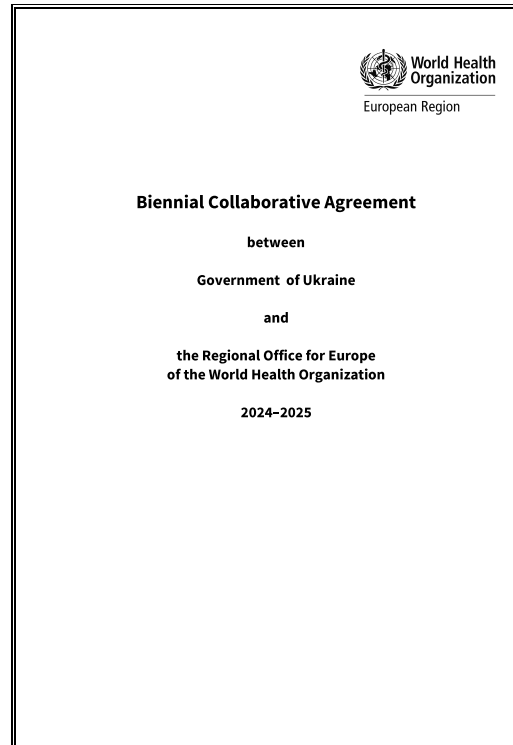

Achieving universal health coverage

Outcome 1

- Improve quality and accountability of Primary Health Care (1.1.1)
- Building capacity of the public health service as part of a strong and resilient health system and in the context of working towards Universal Health Coverage (UHC) (1.1.1)
- Strengthen the country's health system capacity amid the war and during the recovery phase to provide timely, quality, patient-oriented and functioning-based services on rehabilitation and assistive technologies (AT) for all people experiencing functional limitations (1.1.1)
- Improve access to quality-assured vaccination services as part of recovery efforts (1.1.3)
- Strengthening mental health and psychosocial support leadership, governance, and coordination in Ukraine (1.1.2)
- Developing and implementing innovative health financing mechanisms to make healthcare services more affordable and accessible to underserved populations (1.2.1)
- Strengthening the healthcare workforce by training (alignment of curriculums), recruiting, and retaining skilled health professionals, especially in areas facing shortages (1.1.5)
- Health Policy Development: Supporting Ukraine in designing and implementing policies and strategies for achieving Universal Health Coverage (UHC) (1.1.4)
- Continue to provide technical assistance and strategic advice to strengthen a coordinated and integrated Ukrainian health system to deliver on HIV, TB, OAMT and viral hepatitis commitments, strategies and targets (1.1.2)
- Strengthening pharmaceutical and medicines systems in Ukraine (1.3.1)
- Support the Government of Ukraine in the implementation of the National Action Plan (NAP) on combating antimicrobial resistance (AMR) (1.3.5)

Addressing health emergencies

Outcome 2

- Build on the Joint External Evaluation (JEE) and support Ukraine's capacities (including at sub-national level) for prevention, detection and response capacities to health emergencies, including COVID-19, and in line with international frameworks such as IHR (2005) (2.1.1)
- Strengthening national and global surveillance systems for early detection of health threats (2.2.2)
- Building capacity for rapid response and emergency preparedness (2.1.2)
- Advance the One Health agenda in addressing common risks related to zoonotic diseases and food safety areas, in support of national priorities, enhancing multisectoral operations, international guidelines, and the Ukraine-EU Association Agreement (2.1.1)
- Support surveillance systems for zoonotic diseases across various sectors, with goal of developing an information system/platform for automated exchange between laboratories and surveillance systems (2.1.1)
- Support the Public Health Center of the Ministry of Health (MoH) to strengthen laboratory capacity and resilient surveillance system (2.3.1)
- Continue to monitor and support prevention activities for measles outbreaks and polio (2.2.3)

Promoting healthier populations

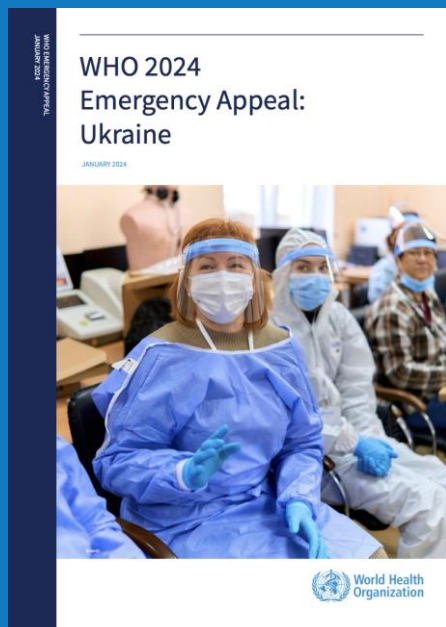
Outcome 3

- Technical assistance to build the capacity of various stakeholders to perform health promotion programmes on various risk factors on the community and national levels (3.2.1)
- Technical assistance to the health sector and multisectoral response in implementing population-based legislative interventions and prevention measures to address key risk factors causing high burden of disease, promoting a healthy diet and physical activity, and preventing overweight and obesity (3.2.2)
- Technical assistance to developing the implementation framework for new tobacco regulations and other WHO FCTC measures (3.1.2)
- Technical assistance to surveillance systems development focusing on NCDs, as STEPS, COSI and other relevant surveys informing evidence-based interventions (3.2.1)
- Promotion of the application of the WHO developed frameworks and guidelines to address NCD risk factors, such as SAFER (alcohol control), RESOLVE (salt, potassium and sugar intake), REPLACE (trans-fats elimination) (3.2.1)
- Provide technical assistance to MoH to conduct NCD-disease-specific surveys to fill in the health information gaps until national surveillance system is in place (3.2.1)
- Support the Government of Ukraine in environmental and sustainability policies within the health sector (3.3.1)

Continuing humanitarian response

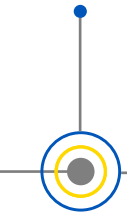
Aligned also with **global and regional priorities**, the CCS demonstrates WHO's commitment to Ukraine through all stages of **response, recovery** and **reforms**.

- Chemical, biological, radiological and nuclear threats

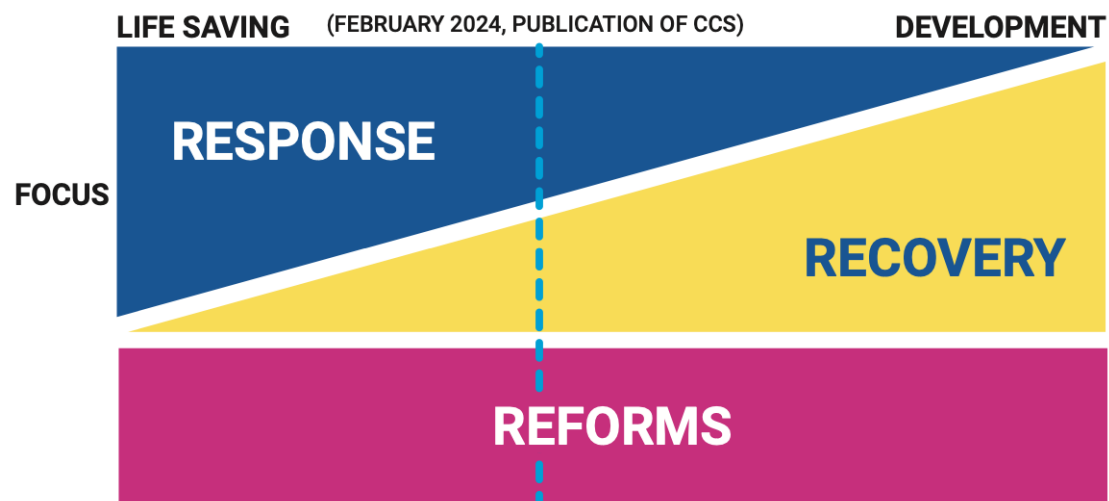
Reforms to build robust institutions and systems

- Improve immunization and address vaccine preventable diseases
- Adopt One Health approach

WHO will adapt implementation to the context



RESPONSE: WHO supports immediate actions to meet urgent direct and indirect emergency needs.

RECOVERY: WHO supports rebuilding and strengthening the health system ensuring access to essential services.

REFORMS: Ongoing process that aligns Ukraine's healthcare system with international best practices. WHO will support systematic changes.

- The World Bank and European Commission can benefit from WHO's technical advice on how best to scale financial investments for health
- Maintains close collaboration with civil society organizations , nat'l and inter'l NGOs
- Will ensure that health care workers are heard; and that communities have a say
- As Ukraine works towards EU accession we engage with European partners
- Will work with all relevant sectors to ensure implementation of the CCS including other UN agencies on the UN Country Team
